

REPORT OF THE 9TH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE (SCAF) – 2017

28 & 29 November 2017

Swakopmund

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Swakopmund, Namibia 28 & 29 November 2017

1. Opening of the meeting

The Chairperson, Mr. Kristoffer Bjorklund from Norway, opened the meeting at 12h00 on Tuesday, 28 November 2017 and welcomed all delegates and expressed his wishes for a productive and efficient meeting.

2. Appointment of Rapporteur

The Secretariat was appointed as rapporteur to complete the report together with the Chairperson.

3. Adoption of agenda and meeting arrangements

The agenda (DOC/SCAF/01/2017) was adopted with no amendments.

4. Introduction of Parties Delegation

The Heads of Delegations introduced their members (Appendix 1).

Presentation of the 2016 Audit Report

Ansie Rossouw, Audit Partner of PricewaterhouseCoopers (PWC), presented the 2016 audit report (DOC/SCAF/03/2017) and the Management Report (DOC/SCAF/04/2017).

The scope of this audit was to confirm if withdrawals made by means of transfers, cash or cash withdrawals have supporting source documents. The audit substantiates that source documents are addressed to SEAFO and payments are authorised by superior signatory.

PWC has not investigated whether items or services purchased were related to the organisation given that 2016 was not a forensic audit.

The auditor noted that the financial statements are free from individual material misstatements and therefore the audit opinion is ungualified. The auditor iterated that the "unqualified opinion" indicates that all amounts above N\$ 150 000 in the financial statements are correctly reported. It does not mean that there was no misuse of the organisation's funds.

Some matters of concern for SEAFO were addressed by PWC in the Management Report. These were

a. Misappropriation of SEAFO funds

A total of N\$ 204 972.28 was misappropriated by a previous employee of the organisation. Details of the nature of the misappropriation were given in the report. The Auditors recommended that appropriate procurement procedures should be applied and payments to suppliers should be made by electronic transfers.

b. Employee benefit reserve

Employee benefit reserves were recalculated by the auditor based on NETT salaries as stipulated in the staff rules.

The Auditors recommended to calculate benefits on GROSS salaries in order to calculate the total cost to the organisation.

c. Administration of VAT in the organisation

Differences between the VAT control account in the general ledger and the VAT returns submitted for the year were detected. The Auditors recommended to perform monthly reconciliations between VAT returns and the general ledger.

d. Authorisation of journals

The Auditors recommended in the report that all journal entries processed during the year are approved by the Executive Secretary since fraudulent transactions can be recorded by means of journal entry processing.

SCAF noted the auditor's recommendations and advised that the Executive Secretary sees them through in a responsible manner.

Executive Secretary's Report on Administration and Finance The Executive Secretary presented an overview of the Administration and Finance Report (<u>DOC/SCAF/05/2017</u>), including staff changes, financial activities and expenditures from January 2017 to September 2017.

The Executive Secretary will have the existing employee contracts reviewed by a labour consultant to make sure that it conforms to the Namibian labour law.

The Executive Secretary reported that not all Contracting Parties had made their contributions at the time of the compilation of the 2017 report and that some Contracting Parties made overpayments, whilst others have underpaid due to exchange rate fluctuations. It was noted that it is important for SEAFO's functioning that the Parties make their contributions on time as the organisation has limited operational funds. Namibia informed the meeting that they aim to make a payment by the end of the financial year (End of March 2018) for the outstanding contribution of 2017.

The Executive Secretary presented reconciliations of the Special Requirement Fund (SRF) which includes the two EU grants received by SEAFO. The balance of the SRF is estimated at -N\$147 673 which means that activities paid for under the SRF were actually mostly paid for using SEAFO funds.

The Executive Secretary was requested to do further investigation on the SRF. Specifically, how the money donated by Norway was used, for next year's meeting.

Projected cashflow statement shows that there should be at least N\$ 1 000 000 available at the end of 2017 to transfer to the SEAFO Reserve Fund.

Discussions followed regarding the misappropriation of funds and the action taken. Concerns were raised by South Africa regarding the legality of the action taken. SCAF advised that the Executive Secretary seek to solve the matter in a way that is fair to all parties and in accordance with the Namibian laws. The meeting concluded that the Executive Secretary will continue to handle the situation with assistance from a lawyer. The Chairperson of the Commission and heads of delegations will be kept informed of the developments and consulted when necessary.

SCAF expressed satisfaction with the report presented by the Secretariat and emphasised the importance of sound management of the SEAFO funds.

5. Approval of the provisional 2018 budget and 2019 forecast budget

The Executive Secretary presented the proposed budget for 2018 (DOC/SCAF/06/2017) and the explanatory notes (DOC/SCAF/07/2017). A correction in the submitted budget was made by deleting the budget item of N\$85 000 for funding of the SC committee. Salary increase of 7% was proposed based on the average inflation rate of Namibia. The budget for employee benefit provisions of N\$ 750 000 for the past years were reduced to N\$ 300 000 for 2018.

The overall proposed budget for 2018 is N\$3 597 693, which is a 30% decrease from the allocated budget for 2017 of N\$ 5 169 381.

The committee agreed to and propose to the Commission to adopt the proposed Budget for 2018 (Appendix II).

6. Contribution by Parties

Contributions by parties were calculated based on the formula adopted in 2009 (Appendix III). The committee took note of the calculated contributions.

7. Any other matters

Namibia informed SCAF that it may consider availing their research vessel for future SEAFO surveys and suggested that the SC prepares a workplan and budget. The running costs will have to be covered by the Commission.

The Committee discussed the appointment of auditors (See <u>DOC/SCAF/09/2017</u> for the three audit proposals received) for the next 3 years from 2017 to 2019. SCAF recommends that Ernst & Young should be appointed.

Election of Chair and Vice-Chair person

The committee agreed that according to the RoP of SCAF, Japan will serve as chair and South Korea as vice-chair for the next two years (2018-2019). Japan nominated Mr Ryo OMORI as Chair.

8. Adoption of the SCAF report

The meeting reviewed and adopted the SCAF report to be presented by the Chair to the Commission.

9. Venue and date of next meeting

The Committee noted that the date and venue of the next meeting will be decided by the Commission.

10. Closure of meeting

The Chairperson closed the meeting on 29 November 2017 in good faith at 12h40.
